At Alkimos Beach PS we know that regular attendance is fundamental to student learning. Every day counts; any absence from school has the potential to adversely impact student outcomes.

### **JAPANESE CULTURAL DAY 2021**

Tuesday March 16 saw our Year 1-6 students work collaboratively in mixed age teams to participate in a range of Japanese Cultural activities. Many activities focussed on rice and co-operative team work. Students listened to a popular Japanese folk tale, "The Rolling Riceball", made and ate their own riceballs (some were decorated as cats, bears and pandas) and learned about rice paddy art trend popular in rural Japan. There were some interesting designs created for a potential rice paddy at Alkimos Beach.









Students applied their Japanese writing skills while copying various Kanji, hiragana and katakana characters (alphabet and picture words) onto pre-painted rocks. We hope to install these rocks in a river formation as a garden art feature in the school yard later this year.





Kimono fabric patterns were examined closely in the Art room with Mrs Harris as well as two other stations. Mrs Harris' artists worked in pairs to complete one aspect of a kokeshi doll in great detail. Each group added to another part of the doll, started by the previous groups. The finished products look amazing with their floral backgrounds added and will be displayed in the library shortly.









Other groups used kimono patterned paper to cut and design their own kimono dolls which were glued onto book marks or door hangers. Japanese kimono, karate suits and other anime costumes were worn in the CosPlay station. Many thanks to Mrs Parkinson who taught these students how to use the green screen app so that they could insert a Japanese scene as the background to their photos. We look forward to seeing those images next week.

Traditional activities such as Taiko drumming, karate, origami, using chopsticks and the traditional toy box required students to focus on a range of band new skills and techniques, often working together with a friend or a team in order to be successful.

### CYBER SAFETY TIP OF THE WEEK!

These tips will help you stay safe online

- 1. Explore together ask your mum, dad, carer or a trusted adult to play new games or apps with you at first.
- 2. Stay close by when you use a phone, tablet or computer by yourself, make sure your mum, dad or carer is nearby so you can get help if you need it. Bonus tip — don't use your device alone in your bedroom.
- 3. Ask before you download, install or buy anything — check with your mum, dad or carer first.
- 4. **Keep your personal information private** don't give out your address, which school you go to, phone number or passwords.
- 5. Check your privacy settings and talk about what to share make your online accounts private and talk to your mum, dad or carer about the kinds of photos and information it is OK for you to share online.
- 6. Cyberbullying if you receive a mean message, or a message that is mean about someone else, try not to respond and don't forward it. Tell an adult you trust about it.
- 7. **If you see something online you don't like** show your mum, dad, carer or a trusted adult immediately.
- 8. If someone you don't know sends you a message or you receive a message that makes you feel **uncomfortable or unsafe** — tell your mum, dad, carer or an adult you trust straight away.
- 9. **Only 'friend' or add people you know in real life** remember that not everyone online is who they say they are, so don't accept friend requests or followers you don't know.
- 10. Don't meet up with online friends It is best to keep 'online friends' online, so if you do chat to other kids in online games don't meet up with them in person.

# **Parent Traps**

### **Parent Traps**

It's tough being a parent but it's easy to fall into one of the common parenting traps.

**The criticism trap** is when there are frequent power struggles with your child. The situations escalate from criticising to threatening and yelling. This type of discipline often backfires. The parent's anger makes the child and parent resentful and hostile. If these kinds of battles take place frequently, its time to try a new way of handling the situation.

**The "leave them alone" trap** involves the parent simply not acknowledging their child when they are behaving well. If good behaviour is taken for granted it may be replaced with the misbehaviour that receives more attention. A basic principle of positive parenting is to praise behaviours you would like to see more often.

The "for the sake of the children" trap occurs when parents in unhappy marriages stick doggedly to the same marriage routines, for the sake of the children, rather than addressing the problems constructively. The perfect parent trap. There is no such thing as a perfect parent and trying to be one will only lead to disappointment, resentment, guilt, and feelings of inadequacy.

**The martyr trap** is one where parents become so over-involved in the task of parenting they neglect their own needs. The parents' relationship suffers and may end in feelings of dissatisfaction and resentment. Quality parenting can only happen when adults have their own lives in balance.
