

This term students in RB6 have been learning about dinosaurs and are enjoying learning about these amazing prehistoric animals.

They have been learning poems and narratives during Talk 4 Writing lessons to promote early connections between oral language and written language. (Ask them to perform for you!) Students have done some sensational work on boxing up the story 'The Little Green Dinosaur' into characters, setting, beginning, middle and end. They have been able to use this knowledge to then attempt their own written retell of the story. Students have been learning new digraphs during phonics lessons to assist in reading and writing.

In Maths students have been investigating division (sharing) and multiplication (grouping) in Numeracy lessons, as well as capacity in Measurement lessons. The boys and girls in RB6 are focusing on being independent learners in preparation for Year One.

































Up in Lights



Occupational Therapy Clinic for Children

Maximising School Participation and Performance



Are you worried about your child's school performance?

Does your child have any of the following difficulties?

- · Poor drawing, colouring and/or cutting skills
- Messy or slow handwriting
- Delayed motor skills
- Can't concentrate in class

- Doesn't enjoy kindy/school
- · Can't keep up with work in class
- Teacher has concerns with child's learning or development

OT @ ECU may be able to help your child

At the beginning of each school year, Occupational Therapy at ECU run groups at the Joondalup Community Clinical School located on site at Joondalup Health Campus. These student run groups are currently <u>free of charge</u> and aim to improve school participation and performance for children who are in the early years of primary school.

PROGRAM STRUCTURE

Your child will be offered a screening assessment in late January 2022. This assessment will be conducted by experienced paediatric occupational therapists and lecturers. If required, your child will be offered intervention in a group setting during term 1 or term 2, 2022.

The clinic usually offers the following groups:

- Ready, Steady, School is a school readiness group for kindy and pre-primary students.
 Typically these groups run once a week for five weeks from 9:30-10:30am.
- Ready, Steady, Succeed is a group that aims to develop essential school skills for children in years 1, 2 and 3. Typically these groups run once a week for five weeks from 2:30-3:30pm.

Each group runs for 1 hour per week for 5 weeks.

HELPING ECU STUDENTS TO LEARN

Second-year ECU occupational therapy students work in the clinic with experienced clinicians. Participation in this program not only benefits you and your child, but also contributes to the education and experience of future Occupational Therapists.

IS MY CHILD ELIGIBLE FOR THIS SERVICE?

Your child is eligible if they are attending primary school in Western Australia in 2022 and <u>are NOT</u> registered or eligible to be registered with the NDIS.

HOW CAN I REGISTER MY CHILD?

WHAT IS THE NEXT STEP?

Once you have sent your expression of interest to clinic staff, you will receive an e-mail receipt and your child's name will be registered as a possible member of the groups. You will be contacted for further information and, if eligible, your child may be offered an Occupational Therapy screening assessment in January (prior to commencing the group program).

Please note: places are limited and therefore <u>not all</u> <u>children</u> will be accepted into the group program.

Parents will be contacted in the order that they apply and therefore, you should register your interest today.



Getting Results

It's natural to want your child to do well at school and some parents use a reward such as money to encourage their children to get better grades. I've often heard of parents offering their child money for every "A" on their end of term report card.

One of the problems with giving children financial incentives for good end-of-term grades is that the reward comes too long after the effort is made.

Rather than waiting till the end of term, it's much more effective to set up a system of rewards which are brief and frequent and which encourage positive daily habits. These daily habits then build towards an eventual outcome, such as a good homework and study routine.

However, you can encourage children to build good study and homework habits without having to resort to offering money.

Why not try a reward such as spending time with your child doing an activity they really like? Or you could offer a special treat you know they'll enjoy. The object is to encourage good routines by giving extra attention and praise or small frequent rewards when they are doing the right thing.


When kids are struggling that little bit of extra attention can encourage them into new patterns of behaviour – and they may end up getting that A after all!
